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Mazama Public House

Mazama Public House was designed to be a gathering spot for the community of Mazama, at the north end of Washington's Methow Valley.

Oriented toward Goat Peak mountain views, the 1,868-square-foot public house seats 56 and another 50 outside with built-in benches on the covered patio. An area to the northwest is planned for an additional beer garden and landscaping.

A garage door system opens in the summer months for connection to the outdoor decks. The dining room includes performance space, and the three large doors will allow for flexibility and increased seating capacity.

The height of the shed roof and the large windows on two sides are sited to take advantage of natural light and views. The interior features wood beams punctuated by blackened steel and concrete floors.

Custom tables and bar slabs were crafted from locally sourced Douglas fir. Outside, blackened steel accents the wood structure. The siding is a dark-stained, rough-sawn vertical channel shiplap.

Green design features include highly durable siding materials, three-foot overhangs to help protect the siding from the elements, and full LED lighting.
